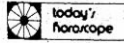

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# French Leader Meets Shah

COURCHEVEL, France (UPI) - French President Valery Giscard d'Estaing cut short his skiing vacation Monday for a word with the Shah of Iran on a possible international energy conference.

The French leader planned to fly to Switzerland to meet Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi in the Iranian ruler's vacation villa.

Aides to the French leader said he hopes to win the Shah's support for his plan to hold a three-day conference of oil producing, consuming and developing nations before the end of the year.

**Clerics Blast Turks**  
NEW YORK (UPI) - Claflus Clerides, a former Cypriot president and speaker of the Cypriot House of Representatives, says he will fight a move to establish a Turkish Cypriot state.

Clerides arrived in New York for an appearance before the U.N. Security Council. "We will explain to the Security Council of the United Nations the coup of the Turkish army," Clerides told reporters. "To create a separate and independent state would be wrong. We will fight against any independent state."

**Double Purpose Sandwich**  
PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (UPI) - Nicolas Caravelle sold his fern sandwich for nearly \$2,000 this weekend to raise money for the Desert Hospital Development Fund.

The bun of the 104-foot sandwich weighed 100 pounds and was filled with three cases of sliced tomatoes, 170 pounds of meat and cheese, 28 pounds of sliced peppers, 40 pounds of shredded lettuce, 1,348 hot peppers and three gallons of dressing.

Entrepreneur Sonny Bono auctioned off two six-inch end pieces for \$300 before about 4,000 onlookers. Caravelle said he was also trying for a place in the Guinness Book of World Records, and as soon as he submitted the information he would disclose the secret of baking a bun that long - all in one piece.

### Pleurisy Causes Pains In Chest

I have had a sharp pain in my chest for six weeks. I just found out that I have pleurisy. I always thought that pleurisy was the same as pneumonia. Is there a difference?

Dear Mrs. M. M.,  
Pleurisy is an infection or inflammation of the "pleura," a fine membrane that covers the outside of the lungs.

Another similar pleural membrane completely lines the inside of the outer chest cavity. In good health, when the lungs expand, these two layers glide smoothly over each other. When there is infection or inflammation of the pleural linings, they rub against each other. This is responsible for difficulty in breathing, and the severe stabbing, shooting pain of pleurisy.

Pleurisy is, in itself, not pneumonia. It may be a complication of pneumonia, or may exist without it.

Before the era of the antibiotics, fluid and pus would accumulate between the two layers of the pleura, and complete pleurisy. Today, almost miraculously, with the antibiotics these complications of pleurisy are rare.
