## **Shell Shocked in Setanta!**



# Brendan O'Carroll's Wobbly Bits

Leisureland was pretty well packed to the rafters on Easter Mon-day to see this gig by Gay Byrne's favourite comedian. Brendan's backing band attempted to warm up the audience with a pretty unimaginative set f cover versions, such as you'd hear in any one of a million pubs any night of the week. Why, for goodness sake? Couldn't they have done something funny? Well, no actually, as was painfully demonstrated by the cringingly witless Waterboys parody with which they closed their set. Entitled "A Bang Up Your Rear", it made the most abysmal student rag-mag look like vintage Flann O'Brien in comparison. But enough about the support, what about the Main Man, the "cheeky little scamp", as the pro-

As his show's title "How's Lenny Bruce in his prime, who Your Snowballs?" would suggest, O'Carroll's humour is largely based on sexual innuendo. More than that in fact, as much of the material is quite explicit, with plenty of effing and blinding to vindicate the "Outrageous" tag of which he and his band seem so proud. Except that none of this stuff is really outrageous at all, is it? It's all rather predictable and tedious. Why spend £8.50 for a lot of curses and dirty jokes - old dirty jokes at that - when you can get both for free most nights in your local pub?

A truly "outrageous" comedian would be someone like

confronted and exposed his audience's prejudices and peccadilloes, while being simultaneously hilarious. Comedy is often a kind of truthtelling. That's why we laugh at a punchline - we recognise its truthfulness. And really good comedy can make us laugh at truths about ourselves which would normally make us uncomfortable. O'Carroll is too often content

to take the lazy option, playing upon the most predictable kind of audience response. And yet when he drew his material from personal observations of the quirks of humamn behaviour, as

he did occasionally, he showed flashes of real wit and originality. A pity he wouldn't develop this side of his act more. But then why should he, so long as he can pack out the likes of Leisureland with his present material? Not so much "How's Your Snowballs?", more a case of "Never Mind the Bollocks!"
