The expansion of the "business district" in Kerrville through this time can be traced through the movement of business addresses in the directory. In 1983 as compared to 1940, it's as if businesses were spreading to the four winds like dandelion fluff.

Some no longer exist. You can't buy fresh cream and poultry at Kerr-Vue Farm or the American Pure Milk Company; Reter's Garage and Studebaker Sales no longer shows off the new year model in their showroom. Stephens Mortuary no longer runs the ambulance service.

But some things remain the same. The Kerrville Flying Service is still without competition. Kerrville Bus Company remains the only one in town. Western Auto remains the place to buy a real Radio Flyer red wagon.

Hart's Pharmacy at 707 Water Street was known as the Blue Bonnet Drug Store in 1940.

Fawcett, Garrett and Burton Insurance agencies are continuations of businesses at least 45 years old.

Of interest are the public buildings, those buildings with offices to rent. In 1940 most were upstairs of shops, six on Water Street and one on Earl Garrett.
